School Dinners - September 2024

Following a meeting of the Finance and Premises Committee of the Governing Body of St Thomas of Canterbury Church of England Primary School, a decision has been made to increase the daily cost of school meals from September 2024.

As you will be fully aware, the cost of food, fuel, transportation and catering staff pay has increased in recent years. After reviewing our catering trading accounts and factoring in these increased costs it has been decided that school meals will increase to £2.53 per day (£12.65 a week) from September 2024.

For parents/carers of children in EYFS and Key Stage 1, this is for information only as your children will still be eligible for universal infant free school meals as set out by the Department for Education (DfE). However, for parents/carers of Year 2 children moving in to Key Stage 2 and for the rest of the Primary School parent/carer community this will impact on you from the beginning of the new academic year.

Please be rest assured that this decision has not been taken lightly but we cannot operate our catering trading accounts at a loss. Please remember that once your child moves to Key Stage 2 you may be eligible for benefits related free school meals. Tips for Helping Children Stay Safe Online

As we start to approach the end of this academic year and look forward to the summer holiday break from school, many of you will be looking for activities to do. Hopefully, much of this will be done outside taking advantage of the outdoor environment, green spaces, local parks and fine weather (fingers crossed!) However, inevitably your child may be spending more time online.

The Policing Institute for the Eastern Region (PIER) have just finished on behalf of the Internet Watch Foundation (IWF) a piece of research and blog post for parents/carers about how they can better understand their children's online world and its risks. Similarly, the Childnet Education Team have updated two of their popular resources on screen time and livestreaming. Every year, the team work directly with over 20,000 children and young people, giving them the opportunity to share current risks, opinions and issues with Childnet researchers. This means that all the work they do is informed by youth voice and what children and young people say.

The Screen Time and Healthy Balance resource contains a collection of quick activities for use with 7-11 year olds to help explore the concept of screen time. It includes ideas for activities on the signs someone has had too much screen time and around finding a healthy balance between online and offline activities. This resource has been updated to keep the activities relevant and up to date in line with what we hear from young people in our school sessions.

The 'To Stream Or Not To Stream' resource contains activities to generate discussions about livestreaming with 11+ year olds. This contains information about livestreaming, two activities with scenarios to encourage discussion and some livestreaming advice from Childnet's Digital Champions and Youth Advisory Board. This resource has been updated to reflect the changes that have happened in live streaming and how this is currently used by young people.

Classes 2024-2025

At this time of year we turn our attention and energies to finalising the classes for the new academic year starting in September 2024. Allocating children and teachers to classes is an extremely complex and time consuming process which takes in to account many contextual and competing factors. Decisions made in order to structure these classes are not done lightly or quickly, but are based on professional judgement and consideration for all children within each cohort.

Moving just one child can have huge reprecussions and acts as a domino effect through the year group. Classes are now finalised; the decisions are not open to negotiation in our school.

Change will naturally cause some anxiety and some people will initially worry about the new academic year ahead. However, the staff at our school have years of experience in supporting this process and will make sure that everyone settles in well to their new classes. Thank you for your trust and understanding.

You and your child will be notified of their new class and classteacher on Monday 15th July 2024 when they bring home their end of year annual report. Please note: this has changed from Friday 12th July 2024 as previous notified on the 'Dates for the Diary' sheet.

Summer Reading Challenge 2024

Marvellous Makers is coming to a library near you this summer!

Essex Library Service and The Reading Agency are teaming up with Create for a very special 2024 Summer Reading Challenge which will be a celebration of the creative arts. They will be inspiring children to express themselves in creative ways, tap into a world of imagination and storytelling, and – of course – to read!

Children will join their wonderful characters, brought to life by the brilliant children's illustrator Natelle Quek, as they prepare for a big festival to show off the work they have created, inspired by their favourite reads. However, the day before the festival, some objects mysteriously go missing from their creative toolbox. The children of Essex will help the characters find these missing objects and save the festival!

The challenge runs from Saturday 20 July to Saturday 7 September in all Essex libraries and mobile libraries. There will also be a special early joiners' day on Saturday 13 July!

Children are being asked to read 6 books, they will collect stickers for their folder for each book they read. After reading 6 books they earn their certificate and medal.

Children can read any library book of their choice; fiction, non-fiction, picture books, books they share with parents and carers, e-books or e-audio – they all count. The under fours are not forgotten with a special version of Marvellous Makers just for them.

The Summer Reading Challenge is delivered by libraries and produced by The Reading Agency. It is open to all children, free of charge.

Prayerfully Learning Together

Year 4 recently got to experience Prayer Space activities in the beautiful and calm setting of the school Spiritual Garden. This is part of the Prayerfully Learning Together research project which is exploring how children interact with, and respond to, different prayer and reflective activities as well as learning how the combination of school, home and place of worship can support a child in their spiritual development. The project is an initiative of the Church of England Chelmsford Diocese and Prayer Spaces in Schools run in partnership with Brentwood Schools Christian Workers Trust and St Thomas' Church as well as volunteers from other local churches many of whom are part of our school family past and present.

Children got to explore questions such as:

- ⊕ What helps us feel connected to God?
- ₱ How do we feel about the idea that God knows our name?
- ⊕ What helps us grow spiritually?
- ⊕ What does a tree provide for birds and how is that similar to what being part of God's community provides for us?

Children got to use and interact with magnets, birds, trees and go on a reflective walk and the activities used some themes from current and previous parts of the Year 4 curriculum.
